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1. Policy Statement

Strathearn School recognises that a clearly defined and consistently applied school uniform plays an important role in supporting a positive, inclusive and well-ordered learning environment. Strathearn's uniform promotes a shared sense of identity, pride and belonging, reflecting the School's ethos, values and traditions and reinforcing pupils' understanding of their role as members of a wider learning community.

The School believes that agreed standards of uniform and appearance contribute to high expectations for behaviour, personal responsibility and respect for self and others. Wearing School uniform supports effective learning by reducing distraction, promoting equality, and helping pupils to focus on learning. It also assists with safeguarding and health and safety by clearly identifying pupils as members of the School community during the School day, when travelling to and from School, and when participating in School activities.

This policy has been developed in accordance with the *School Uniforms (Guidelines and Allowances) Act (Northern Ireland) 2026* and the Department of Education *School Uniforms Guidelines* (February 2026). The policy reflects Guideline 12 (see below at Appendix 1) and other related documents (see below at Appendix 2).

In line with guidance, the policy has been informed by consultation with pupils, parents/carers, staff and governors and reflects careful consideration of the rationale for each element of the uniform and its overall design.

Affordability, accessibility, comfort, practicality, inclusion and equality are central to the School's approach.

The School is committed to ensuring that no pupil is disadvantaged as a result of uniform requirements and that uniform expectations do not place undue financial pressure on families. Where possible, flexibility is built into the policy through the use of multiple suppliers, access to financial assistance, and a pre-loved uniform scheme.

Through this policy, Strathearn School seeks to balance a shared sense of identity with fairness and compassion, ensuring that uniform requirements support pupils' wellbeing, dignity and success, while contributing positively to the safeguarding, ethos and reputation of the School.

3. Aims

The aim of the School Uniform Policy at Strathearn School is to ensure that uniform requirements support a positive learning environment while being fair, inclusive and proportionate. In particular, the policy aims to:

- promote a strong sense of identity, belonging and pride within the School community, supporting pupils' understanding of their shared values and traditions;
- set clear and consistent expectations for dress and appearance that contribute to high standards of behaviour, self-discipline and personal responsibility;
- support a calm, safe and well-ordered environment in which effective teaching and learning can take place, including safeguarding pupils through clear identification as members of the School community;
- ensure that uniform requirements are affordable, accessible and represent value for money, minimising financial pressure on families and protecting pupils from social and economic disadvantage;
- promote equality, inclusion and respect by ensuring that uniform expectations are sensitive to pupils' individual circumstances, including medical, sensory, cultural, religious or disability-related needs;
- prepare pupils for future education, training and employment by helping them to understand appropriate dress, presentation and professional expectations;
- support positive partnerships between home and School through clear communication, consultation and a commitment to working collaboratively with parents/carers when difficulties arise.

Through these aims, the policy seeks to balance high standards with care and compassion, ensuring that School uniform contributes positively to pupils' wellbeing, dignity and success while reflecting the ethos and expectations of Strathearn School.

4. Definitions

Branded item: An item requiring the Strathearn School crest, logo, or bespoke colour/pattern.

Generic item: An item that is widely available and is non-branded, in standard colours.

5. Uniform Suppliers

School Uniform can be purchased from a range of uniform suppliers and online retailers. This is communicated to parents in the Uniform List available on the school website.

In line with the Department of Education's School Uniform Guidelines (February 2026), generic, non-branded items can be purchased from a wide range of sources including high street stores and supermarkets, and online.



6. Uniform Grants/Financial Support

Strathearn School is committed to ensuring that no pupil is disadvantaged by the cost, availability, or suitability of School uniform. Affordability, accessibility, inclusion and pupil wellbeing are central to the School's approach to uniform requirements.

Education Authority Uniform Grant

Financial assistance towards the cost of School uniform is available through the Education Authority (EA) Uniform Grant scheme. Families who receive certain benefits or are on a low income may be eligible for support. School-Based Support

Where families experience difficulty in obtaining uniform items, the School can offer discreet and practical support. Parents/carers are encouraged to contact the Vice Principal (Pastoral). All support will be provided sensitively and without judgement.

Pre-Loved Uniform Scheme

To further support affordability and promote sustainability, the School operates a pre-loved uniform initiative throughout the year. Items are available from Reception or through Barnardo's (Kings Square) through periodic pop-up events, and families are encouraged to donate and use this resource as appropriate.

7. School Uniform

Compulsory items

The School is updating its uniform in response to the requirements of the new legislation ie School Uniforms (Guidelines and Allowances) Act (Northern Ireland) 2026 and the accompanying Department of Education's School Uniform Guidelines (February 2026), which places a statutory duty on schools to ensure uniform provision is fair, accessible, and consistent with current regulatory standards. This change also provides an opportunity to modernise our uniform offer while maintaining a practical, inclusive approach for pupils. In designing the revised *Official School Standard Uniform*, careful consideration has been given to affordability and sustainability, including the durability of garments and reduced reliance on specialist or high-cost items. The intention is to ensure that expectations remain clear and consistent while supporting families and reflecting a more contemporary, efficient standard for school wear.

Therefore, pupils in any year group may choose to wear either the *Official Standard School Uniform* (which is intended to become compulsory for all pupils at the end of the Transition Period) (as defined in Section 18) or the *Traditional School Uniform* (which is intended to be phased out by the end of the Transition Period) as set out in the table below, as well as pre-loved items.

We recognise that during the Transition Period there will be pupils wearing either the current ('Traditional') or the new, updated ('Official') uniform, and in many cases items from both uniform lists. This is an expected and planned part of a sustainable, phased implementation, and all will be fully accepted throughout the agreed transition timeframe.

Our priority throughout this process remains the continuity of pupils' learning and their wellbeing, and we do not expect any pupil to be disadvantaged or unnecessarily affected by the change.



The focus of the School remains firmly on maintaining a calm, consistent environment in which pupils can thrive, while supporting pupils and their families through a gradual and practical transition by the end of the Transition Period to the *Official School Standard Uniform* in line with the requirements of the School Uniforms (Guidelines and Allowances) Act (Northern Ireland) 2026.

* The School is currently working with manufacturers/suppliers to ensure that the Regulation Strathearn School green polyester blazer with School crest is available as soon as possible, and in any event, no later than for the 2027-2028 Academic Year onwards. In the meantime, pupils are able to purchase either:

(i) the Regulation Strathearn School Green Wool blazer with School crest from the usual stockists: or

(ii) a *Girls' Fit 3 Pocket Stain Resistant Blazer in Green* (**NOT** Bottle Green) from *Trutex* online onto which the School crest can be embroidered by a variety of providers (details of which are available from School.)

PLEASE NOTE: In line with the School Uniforms (Guidelines and Allowances) Act (Northern Ireland) 2026 and the Department of Education's School Uniform Guidelines (February 2026), the Regulation Strathearn School polyester blazer will become compulsory for all pupils at the end of the Transition Period and will be available from multiple stockists.



8. PE Kit

8.1 PE Kit – Supplier Arrangements

The School currently has an exclusive supply arrangement with Podium 4 Sport for branded PE kit, which remains in place until the end of the current contract period. As the contract approaches its conclusion, availability of some branded PE kit items may become limited. Where families are unable to source branded items due to stock availability, the School will accept generic, unbranded alternatives that closely match the required colour and function of the uniform item (as listed below).

Any generic items must be:

- Appropriate for physical activity and School use
- Plain and free from logos or branding
- In the agreed School colours.

This approach is intended to support families during the Transition Period (see 18, below) and ensure pupils are able to participate fully in PE activities.

Further information about future PE kit arrangements will be communicated in due course.

8.2 Compulsory items

PE Top:	Strathearn School PE top (Kukri), Strathearn School sky-blue polo shirt (Kukri) or House T-shirt
Skort or shorts:	Strathearn School Green (Kukri) shorts or skort, Strathearn School black shorts (Kukri) or generic black unbranded shorts
Hoodie:	Strathearn School (Kukri) sky-blue hoodie or Strathearn School sky-blue round-neck sweatshirt
Tracksuit Bottoms:	Strathearn School Green (Kukri) tracksuit bottoms, or Strathearn School (Kukri) black leggings, or generic black tracksuit bottoms (with no/minimal branding), or generic plain black unbranded leggings
Socks:	Strathearn School sky-blue hockey socks (Kukri brand) or generic sky-blue hockey socks
Trainers:	Generic laced or velcro trainers with non-marking soles

8.3 Additional sports equipment (Forms 1-3)

Hockey:	Hockey stick [^] , gum shield and shin guards
Swimming:	Swimsuit, swim cap, towel (Form 1 only)
Tennis:	Tennis racket [^]
Sports bag:	Sports bag (no regulations as to colour or shape)

[^] A selection of hockey sticks and tennis rackets are available on loan.



9. Footwear Regulations

- Plain black leather or leather look. They should be sufficiently sturdy for everyday wear and all-weather conditions.
- Laced, with strap or slip-on shoes
- Flat or low heeled. Heels are expected to be no more than 5 cm (2") in height and should be block / cone heels.
- Suede, leather trainers, or canvas shoes are not permitted.
- Trainers should only be worn for PE/Sports.
- Platform or flatform shoes are not permitted.
- No decorative additions such as bows, metal studs or eyelets, chains or coloured sections
- Boots are not permitted.

10. Piercings

Pupils may wear up to two simple, small studs in each ear lobe (lobule) only. Piercings are not permitted in any other part of the ear. Other piercings or 'stretchers' are not permitted.

11. Expectations regarding School Uniform and Appearance

Pupils should wear the regulation uniform in School, when travelling to and from School, and at all School functions and representative events, unless otherwise permitted by the Head of Year or Vice Principal. Pupils should present themselves in a neat and appropriate manner and follow reasonable guidelines regarding personal appearance.

- Blouses/shirts should be tucked into skirts or trousers.
- Belts on trousers, if worn, must be plain black.
- Hair must be tidy and natural in colour. Extreme hairstyles are not permitted.
- Long hair must be tied back when required for health and safety (e.g. during practical classes or PE).
- Hair accessories should be discreet and plain.
- Pupils in Forms 4–Upper Sixth may wear subtle make-up.
- Discreet nail varnish (e.g. clear, pale pink, taupe, or French manicure) is acceptable. Nails must be kept at an appropriate length for hygiene and safety.
- Jewellery is limited to a watch, one ring, and up to two pairs of small, plain stud earrings worn in each lobe. No additional earrings or piercings are allowed.
- For safety reasons, jewellery should be removed for PE.
- Only School badges may be worn.
- Items that do not meet uniform guidelines may be requested to be removed during the School day.
- Pupils with PE last period may go home in PE kit, provided they wear their tracksuit bottoms and a hoodie/sweatshirt; otherwise, they must change back into School uniform.
- Pupils may not wear sweatshirts, hoodies, or t-shirts produced for specific School groups or events, as part of their School uniform.
- During extreme weather, the School may adjust uniform requirements; any changes will be communicated in advance and will be temporary.
- In addition to optional knitwear (see *section 7*), only the regulation School PE hoodie or School PE sweatshirt may be worn under a blazer, and only when travelling to and from School; these must be removed and stored on arrival.



12. Variations to Uniform

12.1 Non-uniform days

On occasions, pupils are permitted to wear clothes other than the School uniform. This may include specific non-uniform days to raise money and awareness for charities, for Art examinations, or when on a School trip. Whilst this allows pupils the opportunity to express themselves as individuals, it is expected to be done in a way which is suitable and appropriate for a school setting. It is particularly important that pupils recognise that the School is a professional working environment and we aim to maintain a respectful, inclusive environment. Staff will handle any concerns with discretion and support.

12.2 Education visits and school trips

Full School uniform is expected to be worn when pupils are going on a School trip, unless alternative arrangements have been made by the lead teacher.

12.3 Representative sport

- All pupils playing extra-curricular sport for School teams are notified of the correct team list. Additional bespoke team wear items are available to purchase following team selections.
- If pupils are involved in a representative sporting activity at the beginning of the School day, they may come to School in their School hoodie (Kukri brand) or School PE sweatshirt and then change into School Regulation Uniform before returning to class. If a pupil is involved in a sporting activity, in which they are representing the School, after break, they should attend School in their School uniform and change into their PE Kit at break or lunchtime.
- Pupils returning home after extra-curricular sporting activities are permitted to wear either School Regulation Uniform or School Regulation PE Uniform.

12.4 Inclement weather

- In inclement weather, a plain black or grey woollen hat (non-branded) and/or a plain black, navy, dark green or dark grey coat (non-branded) may be worn whilst travelling to and from the School and then removed on entering the School building.
- If necessary, pupils are encouraged to wear additional neutral layers under their School shirt.

13. Practical Arrangements

13.1 Labelling

All property brought to School, including items of uniform, are expected to be clearly marked with the owner's name.

13.2 Lost property

Pupils who lose personal belongings should check Lost Property (found in the Lower Corridor) or Reception.

13.3 Safe travel

School uniforms can often be quite dark, making it difficult for pupils to be seen by drivers during the winter months, particularly on rural roads when travelling to and from School.



Parents are asked to ensure that pupils wear high visibility items and/or reflective panels on their schoolbags when making their way to and from the School.

14. Roles and Responsibilities

Board of Governors:

It is the responsibility of the Board of Governors to ensure compliance with legislation. They should also ensure that a written School Uniform Policy is in place, that it is reviewed annually, or when guidance changes and that its effectiveness is monitored.

Principal:

The Principal has operational responsibility for the policy and its implementation. They should ensure that:

- the policy follows the appropriate DE guidance;
- the policy is reviewed;
- liaise with the Board of Governors in relation to School uniform;
- staff are aware of the policy and its procedures;
- set high expectations of uniform standards to promote the School's corporate image;
- the application of the policy is consistent and fair.

SLT/Heads of Year/Form Tutors:

The above members of staff have particular responsibility for maintaining high standards of uniform. They will ensure that the policy is applied consistently and that any concerns are addressed privately and sensitively, with respect for the pupil's dignity.

Staff:

All staff are responsible for upholding high standards of uniform and helping to ensure that the School's Uniform Regulations are followed. With that regard, they should familiarise themselves with the Uniform Regulations as issued annually to parents and staff. Staff should address issues in relation to School uniform and implement strategies to ensure pupils meet the uniform standards. Staff should inform the Form Tutor or Head of Year of any persistent issues relating to School uniform.

Where leading a School trip or event, staff should ensure that the wearing of School uniform/PE Kit, by pupils, reflects the School's high standards with regards uniform.

Pupils:

Pupils at Strathearn School are ambassadors for the School and are encouraged to take pride in their appearance and conduct. Wearing uniform correctly helps promote a sense of shared identity and respect within our school community.

They are expected to familiarise themselves with the Uniform Policy and to seek guidance from their Form Tutor or Head of Year if they are unsure about any aspect of appearance. Pupils are also encouraged to raise questions or suggestions through the School Council.

Parents/Guardians:

Parents/Guardians play a crucial role in supporting pupils to meet uniform expectations. The School values close, open communication with families and encourages parents/carers to raise any concerns or difficulties at an early stage.

Where challenges arise, we are committed to working collaboratively with families to find practical solutions. Parents are asked to notify the School, through the Head of Year or Vice



Principal if their child is temporarily unable to wear full uniform, so that appropriate understanding and support can be provided.

15. Compliance with Human Rights and Equality Legislation

The School's Uniform Policy complies with relevant human rights and equality legislation and reflects our commitment to preventing unlawful discrimination on grounds including race, sex, disability, culture and religion.

16. Reasonable Adjustments to School Uniform

16.1 Long term adjustments

The School will consider and make reasonable adjustments where required, particularly for pupils with Special Educational Needs or disabilities, including sensory needs, provided these do not incur additional costs beyond standard uniform requirements. Requests for long-term adjustments to compulsory aspects of the uniform must be made in writing to the Vice Principal (Pastoral) and will be considered sensitively and fairly. Where such adjustments are agreed, the expectation of a neat and tidy appearance remains. The School is committed to working collaboratively with pupils and parents/carers to remove barriers to participation while maintaining high standards and a consistent School identity, offering all support in a respectful and non-judgemental manner.

16.2 Temporary adjustments

Where a temporary uniform adjustment is required, for example due to an injury or lost item of uniform etc the parent/guardian should inform the Head of Year.

17. Non-Compliance with School Uniform Policy

Strathearn School recognises that there may be times when a pupil is unable to meet uniform expectations. In such circumstances, staff will make discreet, respectful enquiries to understand the situation and offer appropriate support. The initial focus will always be on understanding the reason and supporting the pupil to resolve the issue.

Where appropriate, pupils will be encouraged to correct the issue immediately. If a concern persists, or appears to be part of a wider pattern, the matter may be recorded and monitored by the Head of Year to ensure appropriate support is offered.

Where no clear reason is identified and expectations continue not to be met, the School will work in partnership with parents/carers to agree next steps. A meeting with a member of the Pastoral Team may be arranged to ensure concerns are resolved constructively.

As a community, we rely on mutual cooperation between home and School to maintain high standards for all pupils. Any further action taken will be proportionate, consistent, and in keeping with the School's Positive Behaviour Policy.

Our priority is always the wellbeing, dignity and success of the pupil, and we remain committed to supporting every pupil to represent the School with pride.



18. Transition Period When Changing Uniform Requirements

The School is committed to permitting reasonable transition periods when changing uniform requirements. Consideration will be given to the Key Stage of a pupil; for example, The School Uniforms (Guidelines and Allowances) Act (Northern Ireland) 2026 states that it is reasonable that pupils in Form 1 should be able to purchase new uniform items, while it is unreasonable that pupils in Upper Sixth should be required to purchase same.

In accordance with the Department of Education School Uniforms Guidelines, the School intends to operate a three-year transition period (commencing August 2026 and ending June 2029) to allow enough time for uniform changes (effective from August 2026) to happen smoothly. Accordingly, pupils joining the School in August 2026, August 2027 and August 2028 should keep this transition period in mind when purchasing uniform items.

From August 2029 onwards, all pupils in the School will be required to wear the new Official Standard School Uniform and PE kit in full, as listed above at Sections 7 and 8.

19. Consultation

This policy has been developed in consultation with governors, staff, pupils and parents/carers and in line with the legislation outlined in Section 2.

20. Review

The School Uniform Policy will be reviewed annually in consultation with governors, staff, pupils, parents/guardians. Updates will be made following any incident which highlights a need or when directed to by the Department of Education Northern Ireland and in light of new guidance.

21. Concerns or Complaints

Appendix 1

School Uniforms Guidelines - Guideline 12

3. The value for money declaration if any is entered into on a single and/or limited uniform supplier basis under Guideline 11.
4. Information about, including the outcome of the School's consultation with parents, pupils and anyone else consulted.
5. The rationale for the requirements in terms of the uniform items and overall design which are set out in the uniform policy.
6. The cost of each uniform item, or a range of costs per item, if applicable.
7. The cost of each uniform, or a range of costs, if applicable.
8. The uniform suppliers each uniform item is available to purchase from.
9. When the School's uniform was last reviewed.
10. Information about any uniform bank accessible to parents.

Appendix 3

Rationale for School Uniform

Throughout the 2025-2026 academic year numerous meetings and consultations were held to discuss our School Uniform Policy for the 2026-2027 academic year. School used guidance and legislation from the Department of Education to guide these processes. As stated in the introduction to this Policy, Strathearn School recognises that our School uniform plays an important part in the engagement of pupils, by promoting a sense of identity, pride and unity, while supporting the ethos of the School. Our uniform also ensures that pupils from all backgrounds feel welcome, that it protects children from social pressures to dress in a particular way, and that it promotes good relations between different groups of pupils. In addition, our School uniform supports the Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy, making it easier to identify any individuals who should not be on School premises.

In the review of uniform, to ensure compliance with legislation, a Board of Governors Uniform sub-committee was set up throughout the 2025-2026 academic year to discuss options. This Committee met numerous times throughout the academic year to discuss proposals and comments from the parent and pupil questionnaire (December 2025).
